1.4.2 - How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The insights obtained from feedback are used to make decisions in their light which assist in removing the limitations of the system and give a better environment for students and teachers alike. The feedback obtained from all stakeholders help the institution to understand how others perceive the institution and make necessary changes as per the needs of the society. The college understands the importance of feedback and has developed mechanisms to obtain feedback from all stakeholders. The feedback is collected from students, teachers, alumni, parents and employers at least once a year. Structured performas have been developed for the collection of feedback from all stakeholders. The overall feedback is collected by the IOAC through structured performas. The feedback obtained is analysed and Analysis Report based on the feedback is prepared by IOAC and shared with Director-Principal of the college. The feedback is then discussed by the Director-Principal in meeting with Dean and Heads of the departments and necessary actions are initiated. Feedback regarding curriculum is also collected at the departmental level at the end of each semester and suggestions regarding improvement in curriculum are invited from students. In 2019-20, the feedback was obtained from students on curriculum design and on quality of teaching through structured performas. The feedback from students was also obtained on college infrastructure, facilities and learning resources through online mode in the form of student satisfaction survey. The feedback from students was also obtained in a non-structured manner through meetings with class representatives of various classes of the college. The college has the practice of appointing one girl and one boy as class representative. Regular meetings are held by the Director-Principal with these class representatives and their feedback is invited. The feedback from teaching staff was obtained in offline mode through a structured performa on a 5 point scale. The feedback from parents was obtained through parent-teacher meetings held by the respective departments of the college. The feedback was also obtained in a non-structured manner through interaction with class incharges and heads of the departments in these meetings. The parents are also encouraged to fill structured feedback performss in these meetings. The feedback from

alumni was collected through alumni meets and through alumni representatives in various Boards of Studies. As student alumni is a member of Board of Studies of each department and meeting of BoS is held every year, suggestions are invited from the alumni in such meetings. The feedback is also obtained from alumni through alumni meets which are organised by the alumni association and the college from time to time. Feedback was also collected from employers regarding the knowledge, skills, abilities and values of the students of the institute. Based on the feedback and suggestions obtained, appropriate actions are initiated to address the concerns raised by various stakeholders.

2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The practice of Mentoring focuses on the needs of the students to have a friend, a counselor and a confidante in the college. This is aimed at nurturing a better understanding between the students and the teachers. Valuable Mentors help greatly in identifying diversity in terms of learning challenges as well. A mentor is a teacher who acts both as a friend and a role model, who supports and encourages a student in his/her academic and personal growth. Students are assigned to a faculty member by the Head of the Department who acts as their mentor for the entire program. Mentor regularly interacts with the students and monitors their academic performance. A special arrangement is also made available to the students to deal with psychosocial issues arising in cases like single parenting, bread earner in the family etc. Students facing many issues are asked to call parents for parents- mentor meetings. Mentoring is given regarding professional goals, selection of career in higher education, various career advancement schemes of the government. Other than this mentoring is also provided regarding attendance in class, performance in present semester and also regarding the various rules to be followed during their stay in the institution. Mentors also encourage students to participate in various academic and other events especially when students share their interests. The mentors always keep a check on the attendance of the student, the marks/grades obtained in the internal external examinations, and regarding his/her candidature in the campus placement and provides remedial coaching. Students are counseled by the mentors and by the concerned subject teachers and remedial lectures are conducted. The mentors of the class discuss with each and every student in person and support them in all the promising ways to enhance their academic performance. All Mentors are directly in touch with Director- Principal. Mentors are authorized to report any challenge immediately and seek resources required. This helps the students in

The college augments infrastructure to keep pace with academic advancement and growth. College ensures optimal utilization of budget allocated for the maintenance and upkeep of the college infrastructure by holding regular meetings of various committees constituted to plan and monitor projects to be taken up in a session. Construction, maintenance and repairing of academic buildings, library, classrooms, electrical appliances and other physical infrastructure of college are done by college management. The Property Committee and Purchase Committee of college review proposal submitted by heads of departments as per requirements. Then quotations are invited and the work/supply order is given to vendor with lowest quote. Apart from adding a new structure (rooms and labs) it has upgraded laboratories, purchased additional instruments and equipments in existing labs, sports equipment and computer network. As the development of e-content is the need of hour developing facility for e-content. Infrastructure for e-content development was introduced in this session 2019-20 for this purpose studio room was developed with following facilities stage box 4mic 4 line, connector XLR, head phone, 16 channel audio mixer Yamaha MG16XU, Sony camcorder, tripod stand ,microphone, mic, UPS, Karoke speaker was purchased. Automated weather station was purchased for monitoring and updating weather forecast information. Heads of departments take a periodical review of repairs and maintenance requirements of their respective department by end of financial year. Laboratories are maintained by lab assistants and attendants. To ensure maintenance of laboratories physical verification of laboratory equipment is done. The records of goods/equipments/services are

maintained in the stock register/maintenance register by department with help of lab assistant. College also carries out an Internal Financial Audit. The garden is maintained by beautification committee and some workers. The library is maintained by library staff under supervision of library advisory committee. The committee gives guidelines for procurement of reference books, internet journals, hardware and software necessary for library. The committee ensures the optimal use of library facility by staff and students. The committee organizes book fairs as well as visits to national and international book fairs. The security of college is maintained by security guards. A number of CCTV cameras have been installed to monitor the infrastructure. The Computer, Generator, Water Tanks, Motors and Fire extinguishers are maintained by technicians on hire basis. Staff cabins, visitor's area, record rooms, canteen, girl's common room and Girl's and Boy's hostel are maintained by property committee. Maintenance of equipments is done by the technician on hire basis. Maintenance of computers and ICT facility is done by technicians on the recommendation of ICT in-charge. For maintenance of computers outside vendors are contacted for major repairs and for minor repairs. Software problems are taken care of by computer faculty and lab staff. Non repairable systems kept in store and disposed off after proper procedure of writing off and disposal of e-items. The institution purchases new upgraded computer systems from time to time as per needs.

Energy Conservation • The College building has naturally well-lit classrooms, staff rooms, offices and washrooms to minimize the usage of artificial light. • The College is gradually transcending to energy efficient LED lighting. • Copper wiring instead of aluminum wiring is used in the College. • Air-conditioners (ACs) installed in the campus are five star rated, eco-friendly and are serviced twice a year by authorized technicians. 2. Use of Renewable Energy The College has installed solar geysers in the girls hostel premises for the purpose of heating water. To reduce its dependence on non-renewable sources, the College plans to install more solar panels. 3. Efforts for Carbon Neutrality • The College prohibits the burning of waste material and fallen leaves. Instead, this waste is decomposed for the preparation of manure. • The College recycles its paper waste as well. Faculty

   Students Objectives of the Practice: • To extend financial aid to the poor students especially from the rural areas, which
 allows to save them from discontinuation of their studies owing to poverty. • To extend financial support to all the deserving
 poor students without any discrimination of caste, creed or gender. • To promote 'equality' among the students • To inculcate
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the values of 'generosity' and a 'sense of social responsibility' among the students. The expected outcome is that the students should be able to complete their degrees with good marks. The Practice There are many students coming from the rural areas with low economic back ground. Their parents are unable to provide them a sustained financial support because agriculture, being a gamble with rain in the district is the main source of income for most of the families. The college provides financial assistance in the form of scholarships to the students like Meritorious students scholarships, Ex service men scholarships, Single girl child Scholarship, fee concession etc. These schemes lead to participation of the underprivileged section in gaining access to higher education. Evidence of Success • All the faculty members voluntarily donate a fixed amount of their salary for the financial support of the students. • Poor Student Aid fund has the contribution of Rs. 4,97,890/- from which 121 poor students have benefited. • 5 percent of the amount payable to Examiners/ Paper Setters etc. is given as contribution to Poor Student Fund. • Sunny Oberoi Scholarships are given by a trust named Sarbat Da Bhala to Meritorious students whose parents are deceased. A total sum of Rs 2,88,000 scholarships were distributed to 40 students as scholarships. • Financial support in the form of fee waiver of Rs 4,13,180 has been given to 94 students depending upon the need of the situation for such students. • Likewise, financial aid cum fee waiver of Rs 33,53,039 has been provided to 155 students who have brought laurels to the college in sports. • A total of 199 scholarships worth Rs. 5,43,490 have been given to the needy and the meritorious students in the memory of near and dear ones of the present and retired staff of the college. • The Department of food technology has provide financial aid of worth 14000 rupees to a needy student . The college has provided a fee waiver of Rs. 11000 to the student of Jammu and Kashmir. • Financial support of worth Rs. 238029 has been provided to 15 students of Music Department • Financial support of worth Rs. 321191 contribution to the 22 outstanding students who brought laurels to the college in the cultural activities. • A scholarship worth Rs 45973 has been given to the students who are the wards of college employees. • A special scholarship named Davinder Singh Mangat has been given to 6 students which is of worth Rs. 28,000. 7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 - Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

The main thrust of our educational institution is to develop our students as holistic human beings. For this, the college synthesizes spiritual values, high moral standards and scientific spirit of enquiry. The college believes that physical, ethical and idealistic components of education are as significant as intellectual components. With this objective, the college lays stress on blending of theoretical and practical knowledge. The college makes efforts to transform the young minds into socially committed, compassionate and humane individuals. Mentors pay special attention to this aspect during tutorials. Leading scholars, sociologists, social workers and alternative-medicine advocates are invited to deliver lecture on life lessons. The college inculcates in students a sense of responsibility towards the underprivileged, zeal to serve the community and a love for secular principles. Students are encouraged to organize Ardaas Diwas (Prayer Day) and Sahaj Path (Normal recital of Gurbani) at the beginning and end of every academic session. They are motivated to volunteer for frontline service during Jor Mel (Religious Congregation) and to undertake community service in the adopted villages. Shaheedi Jor Mel is an annual feature of Fatehgarh Sahib. Lakhs of devotees come to attend this religious congregation held in December every year at Gurudwara Fatehgarh Sahib to commemorate the martyrdom of valorous younger sons of the Tenth Sikh Guru, Guru Gobind Singh. Our students assist District Administration in controlling traffic-flow, arranging parking areas etc. NSS and Red Cross units of the college provide emergency services and also organize Medical Camps, Cancer Awareness Camp. Special community kitchen is set up to serve and feed the visiting devotees. The college is surrounded by many villages which are primarily agrarian. The College has adopted five of these villages to sensitize students about their social responsibilities. The Lab to Land programme of the institution enables the students to connect with the community and contribute towards the betterment of a section of society. This programme facilitates the transfer of technology and knowledge to the farmers. The ATM(Agriculture Technology Management) facilitates the farmers in Mushroom production, Azolla production, Vermi-compost production, Honey production and in the production of Exotic vegetables and Strawberry. Through this transfer of technical know-how and skills, students become instrumental in pushing the

rural youth towards self-employment. Free soil and water testing camps are also arranged to sensitise the farmers about the hazards of excessive and reckless use of chemical fertilisers. Various awareness drives and rallies are conducted by the students to spread awareness in these villages about environmental and social issues. The Alumni Association also helps these farmers financially in times of crisis. Besides undertaking plantation drives and organising medical camps, the Association donates sewing machines to empower the rural women and thus lead them to self-sufficiency. On the whole, the Village Adoption Programme elevates the students by giving them a sense of achievement by being socially relevant and by engaging in the inclusion of the marginalised. This entire exercise ensures social justice through equity and access.
